Let God be God. (Matthew 20:1-16)

Sometimes we question God's dealings with other people because they seem to receive better treatment from him than we think they deserve. They do not measure up to our often impossible standards. We think they are unworthy of any favour or special status. So why would God treat them differently?

Ironically, as much as we want God to be involved in our lives and as much as we wish to be part of the kingdom of heaven, we don't always want to let God be God. Instead, we want God to be God as we would choose, relating to people on our terms.

Fortunately, however, God's ways are very different from our ways. God has no favourites. As far as God is concerned, everyone has a unique dignity and equal worth.

It can be very difficult to appreciate that with God all people are special. His generosity is marvellous and His mercy is limitless. That is how God chooses to be and we are challenged to respect God's will. After all, He is our Creator and we are His people. He has rights too and these rights demand that we let God be God.

The lesson of the parable of the landowner hiring workers for his vineyard is that it challenges us to be grateful to God for what he gives us, and exhorts us to avoid feeling cheated and complaining about the seeming better fortunes of others. Also, if we believe that

we are made in the likeness of God, we need to imitate his generosity and compassion in our behaviour towards others. Rather than applying human standards to God, we need to apply God's standards to ourselves.



God's love and mercy are available to all,. When He is generous and merciful to other people, he is not being unfair to us. He is simply being God. Our understanding of God, then, needs to change and we need to let God be God.
